


# Enrollment


The NCI-BC has enjoyed high completion rates in the Diploma program. The figure below provides an overview of coaches engaged in the NCI Diploma program since its inception and identifies the number of coaches who graduated or completed the program (Yes / Red) versus the number of coaches who did not graduate or complete all required tasks (No / Red).

Figure III: Number of NCCP level 4 tasks implemented by NCI-BC



The National Coaching Institute-BC's vision to be the destination of choice to educate and service world-leading coaches continued through 2008-2009 by undertaking a number of initiatives to improve the delivery of advanced coach education. Canada's first National Coaching Institute, the NCI-BC enjoys a proud reputation for developing some of Canada's top coaches, with a unique residential full time program and a high program completion rate. During the past year, satellite programming has continued to develop with diploma delivery initiated in the Fraser Valley (Trinity Western University). Over 20 coaches engaged the NCI-diploma programming in 2008-2009.

Another major change to the NCI-BC saw the implementation of a transition plan to integrate into Canadian Sport Centre Pacific. This integration will enable greater access to some of the most innovative sport performance enhancement specialists and provide customization of programming to fit the sport-specific backgrounds of our coaches. The transition will also expand accessibility to the NCI advanced coaching education support throughout British Columbia. In Victoria, the re-location of the NCI-BC into the new Pacific Institute for Sport Excellence will enable direct access to world-leading practitioners and facilities within a high performance sport environment.

Finally, 2008-2009 initiated the development of a new NCI diploma that aligns to the current National Coaching Certification Program (NCCP) Advanced Coach Education pathway. The new diploma will be based on four themes: Coaching Leadership, Coaching Effectiveness, Performance Planning, and Training and Competition Readiness and is consistent with the new NCCP competency based approach. Parts of the new NCI diploma program will be available starting in September 2009.

The year ahead looks promising for the NCI-BC with enhanced programming and a new location. The NCI-BC continued success is based on strong partnerships with the University of Victoria, Coaching Association of Canada, 2010 Legacies Now and its integration into Canadian Sport Centre Pacific. These core partners in addition to National and Provincial Sport bodies and other Multi-sport organizations that support coaching will help to ensure NCI-BC's mission to develop world-leading coaches at all stages of the Canadian Sport for Life framework and positively impact athlete performance.

Background for Change

Current Challenges

Coaches with the necessary qualifications and experience for NCI have busy schedules with family and or full-time coaching responsibilities.

Coaches who are transitioning to the new NCCP face challenges obtaining past qualifications and coaches and presenters perceive that old Level 4 Tasks program resources are out of date.

New and evolving organizations in the Canadian sport system providing coaching support and programming make the market confusing for coaches seeking services and accreditation.

Coaches want to obtain equivalency of NCI Diploma accreditation and post-secondary Masters of Education in Coaching at the University of Victoria.

Solutions

Create greater flexibility to accommodate advanced coaches with both full and part time programming in Victoria and other regions in BC and enhance tuition support.

Transition to a new and updated NCI curriculum will require greater emphasis on demonstrating competencies and the use of new technologies, with fully resourced coach support through CSC Pacific Staff and other content specialists.


Integrate NCI-BC into CSC Pacific and create a high performance coaching environment at the Pacific Institute for Sport Excellence for advanced coach education in order to provide greater efficiency and increased capacity to access coach services.

Align new NCI diploma to the University of Victoria Masters of education in coaching to take advantage of efficiencies in NCI coaching practicum and university cooperative education program.

International Coaching School

The International Coaching School takes place in the latter part of August and has offered a variety of level 4 tasks and Level 3 Theory workshops over a 9 day program. Over 1200 coaches have attended the ICS over the past 18 years. The figure below identifies enrolment in the ICS since 2004.
