

High Performance Sport Definition










Pre-2010 Legacy Funding Integrated Performance System (IPS)



NCCP SAFEraining 2024 (N=480)













Cross Country Skiing Conversion












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

Review of ecosystem



Membership

- Full Active Members: 15 Youth District Associations and 10 Adult Leagues
- Associate Members: 25 Leagues
- Players: 117,000+
- Coaches: 15,000+
- Match Officials: 4,500+
- Affiliated Clubs and Communities: 100+
- Volunteers and Administrators: 25,000+

- 91+ sanctioned competitions annually across BC
- Presence and active activations in all 5 Regions of the province: Lower Mainland, Vancouver Island, Northern Interior, Kootenays and Okanagan.



BC SOCCER

Integration Process



By 2000s

- Soccer in BC was primarily governed by nonprofit clubs with minimal commercial involvement
- •Growth in youth participation attracted entrepreneurs and private organizations

By 2010's

- •Demand for additional training, sport travel and tourism
- •Diversification of audience and increase of competition
- •Rapid growth of professional soccer, visibility and exposure

By 2020's

- •Introduction of standards-based programs to classify and differentiate soccer organizations based on programs delivered.
- •National recognition and connection to level of competition
- •Standardization of evaluation process and equal rights and responsibilities within the ecosystem

Potential for increased pay-to-play pressures

Risk of competitive imbalance

Administrative burden

Resistance from some traditional clubs

Diverse business models

Potential dilution of volunteerbased model

Financial sustainability concerns

Need for robust conflict-of-interest framework



Creates a unified player development pathway

Expands access to quality training

Aligns all organizations with standards

Supports modern, flexible soccer pathways


